

Welcome to the Inside Track




- Bi-monthly meeting focused on policy, updates and networking

Family need at all time high







CRAs and habitual truancy



Millis vs. MP in 2018 ruled

- CRA habitual truancy petitions are improper unless it's is due to "playing hooky" or conduct beyond the parents' control
- Case of 15 yo girl with autism & bladder condition who missed large number of school days
- SJC ruled her absences were because of her medical and associated mental and emotional impairments not and not willful
- Noted CRA petitions are not an appropriate tool to try to compel a child to attend school



Lexington Public Schools vs. K.S.



Lexington vs KS (3/18/22)

- School filed CRA truancy on 12 yo boy who was in school only 48 days of school year
- Several plans put in place to get child to school but each failed after a few weeks
- School determined no learning disabilities and no IEP
- Parents fighting over custody; DCF involved; probation involved; had not participated in truancy program
- Child's attorney said school is a corporation and could not file b/c assistant principal is a non lawyer; corporations must be represented by lawyers in court


Highlights

- Schools (non lawyers) may file CRAs as do parents (non lawyers)
- CRA hearings are for fact finding: age of child, more than 8 unexcused absences in a quarter and if the absences were willful.
- Judge determined child's refusal to attend school was "willful" and need assistance under a CRA
- Filing a CRA allows JJ court to interfere with custody (DCF)
- School districts are a municipal corporate body governed by different laws than moneyed coporations.

DSM-V updates




- Updates released March 2022 as DSM-5-TR
- Brings back 'unspecified mood disorder'
 - Was removed in 2013
 - Meant clinicians had to choose a specific mood disorder like bipolar
- Adds self-harm without suicidality
- Changed several terms about gender such as "desired gender" to "experienced gender
- Addition of racial and cultural perspectives



DSM-V-TR




- Added 'prolonged grief disorder'
 - Intense thoughts
 of person you lost
 throughout each
 day
 - Sense of disbelief
 - Intense emotional pain
 - Avoiding reminders of the person
- 970k deaths from COVID-19



ED boarding and kids





- MA Health and Hospital sends out a weekly report to its members only
- Began October 2021
- Data provided by member hospitals
- Developed as a strategy to focus on the boarding situation across all ages
- Last week the highest number of kids EVER were waiting in EDs and medical beds.

Budget FY22 and FY23



Boarding Innovation Fund - \$10M

For grants administered by the Executive Office of Health and Human Services to support behavioral health workforce, programs, and pilot initiatives necessary to expand upon and maintain behavioral health acute care beds and intensive community based treatment alternatives in order to enable individuals to be diverted from hospitals or those boarding in hospitals to be discharged, including but not limited to inpatient services, community based acute treatment, crisis stabilization services, pediatric and adult respite, hospital diversion programs, and virtual or in-person partial hospitalization capacity through rate incentives in the Commonwealth; provided further that priority shall be given to grants that support children and adolescent behavioral health; provided further that funds shall be inclusive of workforce recruitment and training, and other funds necessary to expand acute behavioral health support with the goal of reducing ED boarding; provided further that funds may be expended for investments including but not limited to crisis stabilization services for children and adults who are boarding, telehealth devices, specialized training for clinical and ancillary staff including in community crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques, and for capital and operational funds for acute care hospitals to develop and maintain needed services for psychiatric patients while they are in emergency departments or medical-surgical units in order to receive inpatient psychiatric services, including but not limited to investments in surge space and group therapy spaces in emergency department and medical-surgical settings.

What happened to the beds?



- 300 new beds were promised
- Cambridge was scheduled for 42 to open last fall. First, water main break, then COVID outbreak. Starting to accept new patients this week and hope to have all beds open June 30
- Other units cite staffing issues and COVID.



Time for advocacy?



- Dozens of stories in newspapers, television
- Testimony in front of legislative committees
- Many calls to state representatives and state senators
- Calls to DMH, OCA, DPH, MassHealth, insurers and more
